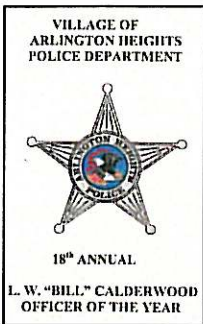

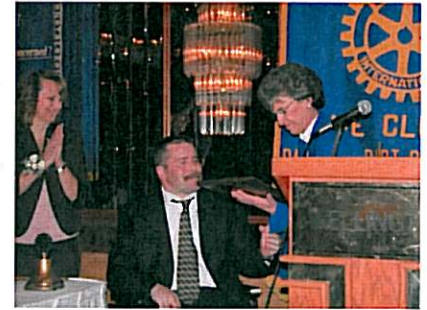
At its March 22nd meeting, the Arlington Heights Rotary Club hosted the 18th annual L.W. "Bill" Calderwood "Officer of the Year" Award Luncheon. The Calderwood Award has always been of special significance to the Village of Arlington Heights, the AH Police Department and the Rotary Club.

The award is named after Bill Calderwood who was appointed Chief of Police of Arlington Heights in 1958. He was responsible for reorganizing the department, was a motivating factor in the creation of a new police facility and through innovation and insight created a police department infrastructure which placed the organization on the leading edge of law enforcement in the northwest suburbs.

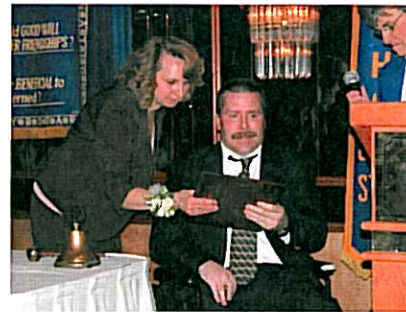
Police Chief Gerald Morning, a member of the Arlington Heights Sunrise Rotary Club, made the introductions. The event was well attended by Village and Police Department officials, Rotarians and Village police officers. Police Chief Morning introduced the Calderwood family and gave them special mention.

Officer Timothy Sheehan joined the Arlington Heights Police Department in 1987. His years of continuous and progressive experience with the Department include Patrol Officer and an



Investigator in the Criminal Investigation Bureau. He is an accomplished police sketch artist and has produced numerous suspect renderings which

have aided greatly in the investigation of complex criminal cases.

Outside the Police Department, Tim has been an active member of the Pipes & Drums of the Emerald Society Chicago Police Department, performing for charitable events, benefits, parades, and funerals for police officers and firefighters killed in the line of duty.

Officer Timothy Sheehan grew up in the city of Chicago, and graduated from Holy Cross High School in River Grove, Illinois. He and his wife Maryann make their home in Arlington Heights, along with their three children, Michael, Mark, and Katie.

At a staff meeting of the Arlington Heights Police Department, Officer Timothy Sheehan was chosen from a group of nominees to represent the Arlington Heights Police Department as the "2006 L.W. Calderwood 'Officer of the Year.'" The other award finalists included: Officer Stephanie Mack, Officer James McGrath and Sergeant Richard Kappelman.

Strategic Planning: Preparation for the April 12th Club Assembly



About two years ago Rotary International initiated two programs that they hoped would revitalize the entire organization from the local clubs on up:

- The *Club Leadership Plan* (see articles in past *Big Wheels* for February 15th, March 1st and March 8th)
- A *Strategic Planning Initiative* (see articles in past *Big Wheels* for February 8th, March 1st and March 8th)

The principal objective of these two initiatives is to increase club member involvement.

In our own February 5th strategic planning meeting, we identified that it is essential for all of our members to be involved in our club's committees, projects and activities.

From the results of our recent member survey, we know that only about 40% of our club members agree that "every club member is involved in a club project or function."

With our April 5th presentation and our April 12th club assembly, we will be taking steps to address this matter. At our April 12th meeting, we will ask club members to join one of five committees (listed

below) to discuss over lunch our club's long-range goals in that specific area as well as begin the work of determining the annual goals for Rotary Club year 2007-08.

- The **club administration committee** conducts activities associated with the effective operation of the club.
- The **membership committee** develops and implements an action plan for recruiting, retaining, and educating club members.
- The **public relations committee** develops a plan to provide the public with information about Rotary and promotes the club's service projects and activities.
- The **service projects committee** develops and implements educational, humanitarian, and vocational service projects that help your community and communities in other countries.
- The **Rotary Foundation committee** develops and implements a plan to support the foundation through program participation and financial contributions.

Profiling Past Presidents

Terry Ennes is a true Chicago native. He was born at St. Elizabeth's hospital, the second of four children. His parents and sister, Kathleen initially lived in his father's childhood home in Sauganash. They later moved to Niles, where his brother Joe and sister Marybeth were born.

Terry attended St. John Brebeuf grade school. After graduating from Niles West High School, he attended University of Wisconsin

Oshkosh for two years before getting a Bachelor's of Science degree in Business from the University of Illinois Chicago. It was on the UI-Chicago campus that Terry met his wife Stacey.

There are unconfirmed stories that several of his college years involved a pony tail (and we are not talking about Stacey here), a trip to San Francisco's Haight- Ashbury neighborhood, fringed vests and attendance at several rock concerts. But these are just unconfirmed rumors that are hard to believe when one looks at the pillar of the community Terry is today.

He did a brief stint at Michigan State University – Lansing, graduate school of business for advanced taxation course work. While this about sums up his formal education, he claims he tries to learn something new everyday.

Terry and Stacey and their daughter Erin moved to Arlington Heights in 1988. Son Patrick arrived shortly thereafter. Of course, Terry was away on business.

Around this time Terry started his property tax consultancy, Ennes and Associates. Naturally, he started becoming very involved in the community of Arlington Heights at this time.

Initially, he became a member of the Arlington Heights Chamber of Commerce. He served seven years on the Chamber's Board of Directors and in 1997 became their 49th President. Having scaled those heights, Terry was available for new venues for community involvement. In 1998 his good friend Ron Walter sponsored Terry for membership in our Club.(Ron may still wonder why he did that.)

During his first two years in the Club, Terry worked on several Club projects. He was "invited" to join the Club's Board of Directors in 2000. (He enjoyed it so much that we still have not been able to get him off of the Board.) In July he will begin serving his second year as Immediate Past President. Terry has held all positions on the board except the two really difficult one's Treasurer and Club Secretary. That took him a lot of hard work and some pretty nifty orchestrating to accomplish that feat.

During his presidential year (2005-06), Rotary International kicked off its second century and our Club celebrated it 50th anniversary. As if that were not enough, the Club had several further

accomplishments. Terry gives thanks in part to the excellent Board that worked with him that year.

Even before the Board's actual installation, Treasurer Kris Stabler had prepared and submitted a budget, that was largely funded by the Club's first ever 400-ticket Raffle "sale," which raised approximately \$42,000. Terry's Board was not even out of the gate and they were off and running . . .

During that year, The Club generously gave:

- \$14,000 for Solar Ovens for a Zimbabwe Orphanage
- \$2,500 for a well in Nigeria
- \$9,000 to complete our Centennial Project for Clearbrook's men's home
- \$2,500 donated for the ARC for Hurricane Katrina Relief
- \$1,400 towards our Thanksgiving and food pantry program
- Thousands of books donated to the Book Worm Angels' Literacy Program
- \$4,900 to our "Holiday Giving" project for needy local children
- Scholarships totaling \$6,500 (Book and Vocational)
- Continuing support to a local Boy Scout Troop (which we had chartered) and for their Leadership Training Programs
- \$8,000 donation to the Northwest Suburban Council of the Boy Scouts of America
- \$2,000 grant to the Dist 214 Foundation's "Backstretch: Project

The Club's other, non-financial achievements were many. We

- Obtained official status Charitable Foundation
- Started development of the new website
- Added 6 new members
- Sponsored, Kel Miller as an exchange student in Eastern Russia
- Hosted the District GSE Team of educators from Japan

And we still had plenty of time for fellowship and fun with an installation dinner, a Valentine's Day gala, raffle, steak fry and a holiday party.

In his professional life, Terry is president of a national property tax consulting firm serving taxpayers in 44 states and Canada. He holds a Certified Member of the Institute (CMI) designation from the Institute for Professional in Taxation and is a founding member and first Vice President of the National Council of Property Taxation.

In his free time he serves as a Commissioner on the Village of Arlington Heights Plan Commission and as a trained volunteer leader of the BSA.
