He was born in Chicago, grew up in Skokie, and attended Niles East High School. Steve attended Triton Junior College and Columbia College. He has been married for 7 years, and has lived in

Steve first got his hands on a camera at age 14 and hasn't stopped taking photographs since. He won his first photography award at Columbia College. After attending Columbia, Steve spent two and one half years working in Los Angeles, and then returned to Illinois to work at a studio on Barrington. The owner of that studio, Tom, eventually became Steve's good friend and mentor. After working for Tom for 9 years and managing the studio, Steve formed Sampson Photographic 10 years ago. Tom was instrumental to Steve in learning his craft and starting Sampson Photographic. In carrying out his business, Steve's goal is to be an "artist with a camera", rather than just a photographer.

Steve practices a deep Christian religious faith and considers his life to be blessed by God. He lives by the basic tenant that you "reap what you sow", and

maintains a positive attitude toward his life and work goals.

Steve is a board member of the Arlington Heights Chamber of Commerce, a member of the Arlington Heights Arts Commission, and is also involved in "Champs". Preparing Our Club For Rotary Year 2007-08

At the beginning of 2007, our Rotary Club embarked on an initiative to adapt and implement Rotary International's *Club Leadership Plan*. An important part of this initiative was to create a long-range—three to five year—plan for the club and a 2007-08 annual plan that is consistent with that long-range plan.

We have made substantial progress toward the completing that original charge. RI's "check list" indicates that we should do the following before July 1st:

1. Complete a long-range plan that addresses the club's service goals for the next 3-5 years including service projects, membership, The Rotary Foundation, and leadership

- development. Include how the club will promote its activities in each of these areas.
- 2. Complete and have our District Assistant Governor sign RI's *Planning Guide for Effective Rotary Clubs* which outlines our goals for the upcoming Rotary year.
- 3. Set dates for the following in order to prepare for the upcoming year and keep club membership informed:
 - Club assembly after district assembly
 - Club assembly in preparation for governor's official visit
 - Other club assemblies
- 4. Develop a communication plan
- 5. Developed a system for continuity in leadership:
 - President-elect and president-nominee are involved in decision making.
 - Chair-elect appointed in addition to chair for each committee.
- 6. Adopt the Recommended Rotary Club Bylaws
- 7. Plan fellowship activities for the year.
- 8. Develop a system for keeping all members active in the club by ensuring:
 - All members are appointed to a committee
 - All members are involved in a service project
 - New members are assigned activities to help them get involved in the club
- 9. Club has a comprehensive training plan:
 - President-elect has attended PETS
 - Incoming club leaders have attended the district assembly
 - New member orientation is offered
 - Club members are encouraged to attend:
 - District Rotary Foundation seminar
 - District membership seminar
 - District leadership seminar District conference

The Club's Board of Directors is working to complete these tasks. Some items, such as 6 above, require club approval. The revised club bylaws will be distributed shortly in order to allow a ten day review period before the club is asked to vote on the new bylaws. All of the above items require involvement and participation by all of our club members.

Profiling Club Board Members

Paul Hester was born at St. Anne's Hospital on the near northwest side of Chicago on April 9, 1941, almost eight months to the day prior to the start of World War II, fortunately avoiding the stigma of being a "Baby Boomer."

My father died in an accident at the age of

29 in 1945 and my mother Irene, older brother Edward John III and younger sister Laura Rose, moved in with my fraternal grandfather Peter who, some years later, I named my son after.

In 1947, "Gramps" decided that he was tired of living in the city that he had actually help build and declared that we should move to Cary, Illinois where he had a summer home built on the Fox River in the

early 20's. Growing up in Cary was to me like "living on the frontier" because in those days it really was wild. Though we didn't get to play much with other kids like we had done in the "city," I couldn't have been happier. Many a time, I hunted pheasants and rabbits by myself on our property at the age of ten before going to school. I started hunting when I was seven with my favorite uncle and brother, but I wasn't allowed to carry a gun until I was nine.

I moved back to Chicago at age 18 and lived, worked, wed and had two children, Peter and Christine. I attended DePaul University night school for six years, leaving as a second semester Junior on the "Dean's List," due to the pressures of work and a young family. I later moved to Hoffman Estates and our first home, to later go back to live in Chicago after a divorce.

During and just prior to that period of my life, I worked as the Sales Promotion and Merchandising Manager for Skil Power Tools; Consumer Products Marketing Manager for Rustoleum; Market Development Manager for the Hirsh Company and the Marketing and Sales Manager for Wico Corporation in Niles.

Around that time I met and fell in love with Judy and in 1974 we married and merged our two families, resulting in a six really great children household. From oldest to youngest, we have Lorrie, Joe, Debbie, Peter, Judy jr. and Chris, all now in their very late to early 40's. Judy and I moved to Arlington Heights in 1986, after all but the two youngest had either married or moved out on their own. Our children have provided us with a total of nine of the most wonderful grandchildren possible, ranging in age from 11 to 24.

I served as a Board Member of the Arlington Heights Chamber of Commerce for six years and have been on the Board of Crime Stoppers since 1994. Around 1995, I joined the Breakfast Rotary Club for about two years and then struggled to become a member of the Noon Rotary. In 2001, Ken Alger sponsored my membership and my transfer to this club was approved.

Besides the opportunity to channel my desire for service to the community I particularly enjoy the opportunity Rotary provides for fellowship and friendship with a wonderful group of community minded individuals. I have served for three years as International Service Committee Chair, a position I held in the Sunrise Rotary, and have been a member of the Board of Directors for that time. I became a Paul Harris Fellow while a member of the Sunrise Club and recently gave a Paul Harris Fellowship to Judy last year.

One of the most enjoyable things for me about Rotary is the feeling of being welcome when visiting another Club because of our Rotary bond. This is most evident to me when I make up a meeting while traveling away from Chicago. The best "make-up" for me, ever, was when Judy and I were traveling in Hong Kong. The Club meeting was held in a hotel on Nathan Boulevard (the Michigan Avenue of Hong Kong) and although everyone at my table was from a different country, I was treated as an "old friend" and felt completely at home.
